Welfare News

Friday, 15 March 2019, is The National Day of Action against Bullying and Violence (NDA). The theme this year is Bullying. No Way! Take action every day. The NDA is a fantastic opportunity to highlight the steps Concord High School takes every single day to promote respectful relationships and prevent bullying. We do this informally through our PB4L system and formally through our welfare and discipline policies and initiatives.

Today, Years 7, 8 and 10 are involved in specific workshops focusing on Anti-bullying. I am hoping that your child will come home and carry on these conversations with you over the weekend.

As in all things Welfare, I believe a respectful and committed partnership between school and home goes a long way in ensuring a positive outcome. This article below from REACHOUT gives parents some helpful tips when dealing with bullying issues.

How can you - parents - support your young person?

Young people only need one bad experience, and it can make them afraid to ask for help again. You are the most important adult in your teen's life, and with your support, they can work through any issues:

•Research anti-bullying strategies together and use it as an opportunity to plan. REACHOUT bullying resources are a great place to start.

•It might sound a little funny, but limiting eye contact can actually make those awkward moments a bit easier. Driving in the car or washing the dishes can be great opportunities for a more serious chat.

•Make a solid plan with your teen over when they will approach a teacher – after class, book a time during lunch? Discuss whether they want you to be there the first time they talk to the teacher, or would they prefer to do it alone?

•Ask them to think about a time when a teacher was really helpful at school. What worked well? What did they find useful, or not?

•If they're worried about people at school finding out, suggest your teen talk to their teacher at a time they know is private, like after class. They should also let the teacher know that they're worried and ask the teacher to keep things private.

•Chat to your teenager about other adults in their life that they trust. Maybe they would prefer to talk to them about it before approaching the school.

It can be confusing for parents and young people to know how to approach their school about a bullying issue. There are lots of different things to try, but the most important thing is that your teens know that they can trust you, and that's you'll be there to support them, not matter what's going on at school.

** All activities in the coaching program will commence in <u>Week 2 of Term 2</u>** (Week commencing 7th May 2019)

- Students must remain within the area/s designated by supervising staff
- Students must not leave the group to undertake independent activities

Google Classroom Email Summaries for Parents

Parents will soon be able sign up for emails providing details about their child's school work and homework.

The majority of classes at our school uses Google Classroom to set work tasks for students and this has been a very successful way of students seeing all their work tasks on their device. In many cases, the tasks can be completed on their device.

Google have recently launched a new feature called Google Guardian which allows parents to sign up for daily or weekly email summaries of the Google Classroom activity. These email summaries provide details such as

- Any tasks from the previous week that has not been completed.
- All tasks for the forthcoming week.
- Any other announcements and grades from tasks that have been marked and entered into Google Classroom.

Parents will soon receive an email to sign up for this service. The invitation to receive Google Guardian emails will be sent to parents and those who have parental responsibility for a child, as recorded on our school administration system. Please note that we cannot offer the Google Guardian email service to any person other than a child's parents or other adults with parental responsibility.
