# **Covid isolation updates**

Just a quick summary of the change to self-isolation requirements for close and household contacts who have recovered from COVID-19.

# Changes are:

If a student or staff member who has recovered from COVID-19 comes into contact with someone with COVID-19 within 12 weeks after they are released, they will generally not need to self-isolate or get a test. They can continue to go to school or work unless they have new COVID-19 symptoms.

Reminder for those who are close or household

If a person in your household tests positive to COVID-19, they must self-isolate for 7 days from the date of their positive test. They must follow the advice for people testing positive to COVID-19. If the person is unable to safely self-isolate by themselves (e.g. due to their young age), a parent or carer should self-isolate with them.

The entire household must also self-isolate for 7 days from the date of the positive person's test. They should follow the advice for people exposed to COVID-19 and take a test as soon as possible, have another test on Day 6 and at any time COVID-19 symptoms appear.

If another person in your household tests positive to COVID-19, that person must restart their 7 day self-isolation period from the date of their positive test, even if they don't have any symptoms.

Other household members who test negative, do not need to re-start their 7 day self-isolation period. They also do not have to self-isolate again anytime in the following 14 days unless they test positive.

People who test positive to COVID-19 and complete their 7-day self-isolation period do not have to test or self-isolate as any type of contact for 12 weeks after their release.

# ANZAC DAY SERVICE AT CONCORD HIGH SCHOOL

Anzac Day is one of Australia's most important national occasions. It is commemorated on 25 April each year in Australia. It marks the anniversary of the first major military action fought by Australian and New Zealand forces during the First World War when ANZAC troops landed and fought in the Gallipoli Campaign. ANZAC Day has been commemorated since 1916 and is a National Day of Remembrance in Australia and New Zealand that broadly commemorates all Australians and New Zealanders who served and died in all wars, conflicts, and peacekeeping operations and the contribution and suffering of all those who have served.

Concord High School commemorated ANZAC Day on the 7 April 2022. Mr Colin Hodges, President of the Burwood RSL Subbranch, as well as Ms Engisch, Mr Anderson, Ms Milinovic and Ms Gofers attended an ANZAC Ceremony at the school. Student representatives from the Prefect Body and students from Year 11 Modern History and 7 History W also attended this service.

During the Service the Ode of Remembrance was recited. The Ode of Remembrance has been recited to commemorate wartime service and sacrifice since 1921. The Last Post and The Rouse were also played. In military tradition, the Last Post is the bugle call that signifies the end of the day's activities. It is also sounded at military funerals to indicate that the soldier has gone to their final resting place. The Rouse is a short bugle call that was also used to call soldiers to their duties.



### Review your academic goals and organise yourself for Term 2

The end of term is a time where we congratulate ourselves for making it to an end point. Congratulations, we made it and the time to collapse, even if just for a few days seems imminent. It's important to remember that a finish line is also a renewal point. Here, at the end of Term One is a key time in a student's life to review what worked well, what didn't go so well, and evaluate what changes need to occur to renew and prepare the self for the term ahead.

The end of Term One is a key time to review:

- What successes can you celebrate? What were you proud of in yourself and your school work over these tumultuous weeks of Term one?
- What barriers did you encounter this term that may have affected your ability to stay on top of homework and assessments? How did you respond to these challenges?
- What are your academic goal(s) for Term 2? What specific skills do you need to improve to perform better in a particular subject by the next assessment point?

E.g.

Skills to improve	Subject	To achieve
Familiarity with keywords: I can spell them; I know what they mean; I can use them purposefully in my work.	Science	An improvement in my scientific explanations

We highly encourage our senior students to book an Academic Check-Up with Dr. Cheung in the Senior Learning Centre within the first two weeks of Term 2 to identify key short and medium term goals.

Parents of students in Years 7-10 are highly encouraged to use the prompts and the model above to have those important conversations that help young people prepare themselves to achieve their academic goals.

# **Literacy Update**

Thank you for your all of your support during this term. Term 2 is set to have several busy exam periods with the shift to NAPLAN Online and Minimum Standards occurring over the following dates:

### Year 7 and Year 9 NAPLAN Test Window:

Tuesday 10 May- Friday 18 May (Weeks 4-5)

### Year 10 Minimum Standards Test Date:

Monday 2 May 2022 (Week 2)

Further information will follow about NAPLAN and Minimum Standards at the beginning of next term, however, in the meantime, it will be important for your child to:

- 1. Download the appropriate lockdown browser and
- 2. Purchase a set of headphones with a 3.5mm headphone jack that can be plugged into their device.

While it is not possible to 'study' for either of these exams, which are external skills-based assessments, we strongly encourage your children to reset and integrate reading into their holiday schedule. Students have been informed about The Premier's Reading Challenge during their Literacy and Humanities lessons and the school Library is an excellent resource to utilise for accessing books prior to the break.

I would like to wish you and your families a safe and happy break. I hope you are all able to enjoy the exciting festivities happening in the community over this holiday period.

### **Minimum Standards Literacy and Numeracy**

In NSW students aiming to receive the HSC from 2020 are being supported in achieving the minimum standards of literacy and numeracy. To show that they meet the minimum standards students need to achieve Level 3 or 4 in reading, writing and numeracy tests. Please be aware that students have 5 years (from when they begin their first HSC course) to achieve the minimum standard in reading, writing and numeracy.

Year 10 students at Concord High School will be working to meet the minimum standard in 2022. The guidelines surrounding the HSC minimum standards test in 2022 allow four opportunities per year provided for the students to attempt the minimum standards test in the school environment.

Whole-cohort testing is organised and facilitated by classroom teachers, the Learning and Support team and students sitting the tests in their Mathematics classes. All room supervisors will be provided with clear and detailed instructions to assist them in supporting students through the first attempt at Minimum Standards Tests.

Students will also be provided with the letter and reminders via their Google Classroom. Additional support will be provided to students to support the following:

Those who do not meet the minimum standard in 2021 will be entered into a minimum standards program Concord High School is running for Year 11 and 12 students in 2022. Further details will be provided if required.

Dear Parent/Caregiver,

As educators, we believe that the practice of frequent, sustained wide reading is essential for the development of students in both educational and social settings. To foster the practice of regular reading in our students, Concord High School's English Faculty is working towards implementing a D.E.A.R (Drop Everything and Read) initiative in all English classes.

A key component to effectively implementing the D.E.A.R program is to ensure students have easy access to quality literature. 



Mr Shephard and the year 10 Wood Technology class are progressing well through their current practical. Students have been working throughout term 1 implementing newfound skills with a wider range of power tools and workshop equipment. The timber keyhole stool project has been an outstanding success as students take part in developing their selection of tools, materials, and processes.

In Year 10, students are given to opportunity to use equipment including: Band saws, drum sanders, biscuit joiners, and edge trimmers on top of the existing foundational workshop tools from stage 4.

The project drawcard is revealed when students select their timber for the stool tops. The range of hard and softwoods included: Radiata Pine, Tasmanian Oak, Jarrah, Meranti (Pacific Ash) and Blackbutt. Once laminated, sanded and edge trimmed, students begun to see the fruits of their labour. This wider selection of timber species has allowed students to create aesthetically pleasing individual projects.

# **After School Tutoring**

Dear Parents and Carers,

Concord High School offers an After School Tutoring program on a term by term basis. Tutoring will commence Monday of Week 2, Term 2 i.e. May 2<sup>nd</sup>.

These tutoring sessions take place on a Monday, Tuesday or Wednesday afternoon at two intervals: 3-4 pm or 4-5 pm in the Library at Concord High School.

The program offers either private or small group tuition (in pairs or groups of three) for English, Maths, and Science. Our tutors specifically focus on providing feedback for lesson content, homework, class assessments, and general academic focused support to each student.

Note: This program is highly limited due to the availability of tutors at this time. All times and options will be discussed before final placements are confirmed.

Parents and carers are also reminded that students are expected to come to the session with work prepared as our program DOES NOT require the tutors to create content for these sessions.

The pricing/cost of the tutoring sessions are as follows:

- Private Tuition (Tutor: 1 student) \$55 per 1-hour session
- Paired Tuition (Tutor: 2 students) \$42 per 1-hour session
- Shared Tuition (Tutor: 3 students) \$35 per 1-hour session [Shared sessions are limited due to the availability and requirements of the individual students for the subject areas chosen]
