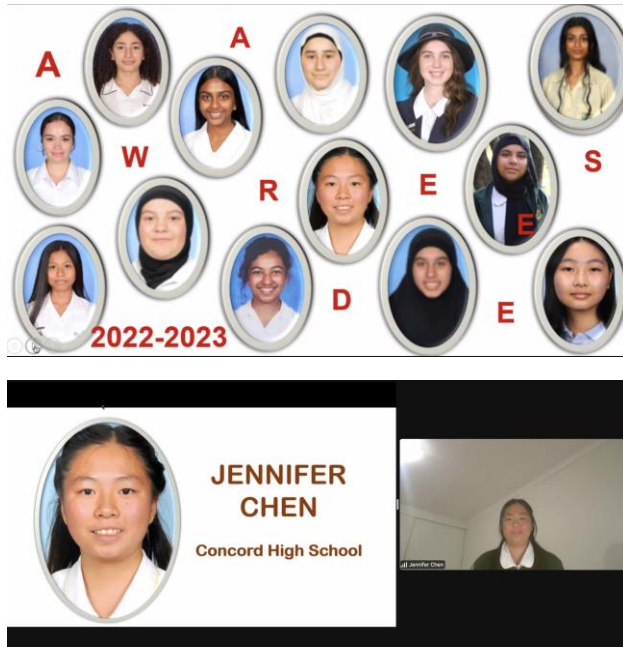

Concordia Kindness Week

During week 3, students of Concord High School celebrated Concordia Kindness Week. Careers Corner

Is your child in Year 12 and planning to go to university?

UAC access and scholarship schemes

If your child is a domestic* student, they may wish to apply for one of UAC's access and scholarship schemes <https://www.uac.edu.au/future-applicants/scholarships-and-schemes>

(Please note: *International students are not eligible for these UAC schemes).

1. Equity scholarships help disadvantaged students with the general costs associated with tertiary study.

They are awarded to students from low socio-economic backgrounds, particularly those who receive Centrelink income support payments such as ABSTUDY, Austudy, Youth Allowance, JobSeeker Payment, Disability Support Pension, Parenting Payment (Single) or the Carer Payment.

2. The Educational Access Scheme (EAS) aims to help 'domestic*' students who have experienced significant educational disadvantage receive an offer to university. Student applicants must be:

- a UAC undergraduate applicant (Year 12 student, who is getting an ATAR)
- an Australian citizen, a New Zealand citizen or a permanent resident of Australia (including a holder of an Australian permanent resident humanitarian visa).

***International students cannot apply for EAS.**

To apply for EAS students must be able to demonstrate that, as a result of circumstances beyond their control or choosing, their studies were negatively affected during Year 11 and/or Year 12. Generally, students will need to demonstrate that their studies were negatively affected for a period of 6 months or more, throughout Year 11 and/or 12.

For Year 12s, this is calculated up to the end of October, when studies for the HSC are completed. Disadvantages that occur after October are not eligible for EAS assessment, as they will not have had an impact on a Year 12 student's educational performance.

Important dates for 2023 and 2024 EAS applications – for students:

23 November 2023

Deadline to submit your EAS application and documents to guarantee receipt of your eligibility letter by 14 December (before December Round 2) for your EAS eligibility to be considered in December Round 2

14 December 2023

Eligibility letters emailed to all applicants whose assessment is complete

26 December 2023

Deadline to submit your EAS application and documents to have them considered in January Round 1

2 February 2024

EAS applications close.

3. Schools Recommendation Schemes (SRS) are one way institutions make early offers of undergraduate admission to Year 12 'domestic' students, using criteria other than (or in addition to) the ATAR. Students applicants must be:

- a UAC applicant for undergraduate admission in 2024 (currently in Year 12, and applying for university study in 2024)
- an Australian or New Zealand citizen, a permanent resident of Australia or holder of an Australian permanent resident humanitarian visa.

HISTORY OF SHAVE

LET'S LEARN ABOUT ONE OF AUSTRALIA'S LONGEST RUNNING AND MOST LOVED FUNDRAISING EVENTS

THE GRAYDON FAMILY

World's Greatest Shave (in the beginning it was called *Shave for a Cure*) began with the Graydon family in Lismore, northern NSW. Eric Graydon was diagnosed with acute myeloid leukaemia and had to move to Brisbane to access life-saving treatment. Eric and his family were able to stay at the Leukaemia Foundation's ESA Patient Accommodation Village for a total of 14 months at no cost while he focused on getting better. To show their appreciation and help others facing blood cancer - the family decided to hold the very first shave...

SHAVE FOR A CURE

In September 1998, Eric's wife, Loma and their daughter Cathy held the first ever fundraising shave event for the Leukaemia Foundation. Eric's hematologist, Dr James Morton thought it was such a great idea that he challenged the Leukaemia Foundation to shave the greatest number of heads in 24 hours. The word got out to the media — and with the support of the community, the event raised a huge \$80,000 and shaved a whopping 200 heads. With that — *Shave for a Cure* was born!

TIMELINE

- 1998 — the Graydon family hosted the first ever shave event for the Leukaemia Foundation and raised \$80,000!
- 1999 — the first *Shave for a Cure* raised over \$1.5million and shaved over 1700 heads!
- 2000 — the first Australia-wide *Shave for a Cure* took place in March and saw 20,000 people around Australia shave or colour their hair and raise over \$3.6 million.
- 2002 — the Leukaemia Foundation took a bold step and began TV commercials.
- 2003 — the name officially changes to *World's Greatest Shave* and the campaign was inducted into the Guinness Book of World Records for most heads shaved.
- 2007 — the TV ads took a new turn when the now famous 'chin-people' commercials were created.
- 2011 — the 'My Shave' app is launched.
- 2013 — this year marked the biggest fundraising year in *World's Greatest Shave* history, raising \$20,000,000!
- 2018 — *World's Greatest Shave* celebrated 20 years of shaving the world from blood cancer!
- 2019 — More than 23,500 people registered for *World's Greatest Shave* and raised \$17.2 million for people living with blood cancer.
- 2020 — In a year that included bushfires and COVID-19, over 20,000 *World's Greatest Shave* superheroes raised \$12 million to help Aussie families impacted by blood cancer.

WHY DO PEOPLE SHAVE?

Courageous Aussies take part in *World's Greatest Shave* for lots of reasons. Some will have a personal connection to blood cancer, while others take part simply to have fun, tick a bucket list box and raise money for a good cause.

When someone signs up to shave, cut or colour for *World's Greatest Shave*, they fundraise to make sure families facing a blood cancer have a place to call home during treatment, someone to turn to, and access to the best possible care and treatment.

Money raised by *World's Greatest Shave* also helps to fund Australia's best and brightest blood cancer researchers in their quest to deliver rapid advancements in diagnosis, treatment and ultimately — a cure.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION FROM OUR CONSTITUTION

The objects and functions of this association shall be those set out in Section 116 of the Education Act 1990, which include:

(i) The objects:

- (a) to promote the interests of the school by bringing parents, citizens, students and teaching staff into close co-operation; and
- (b) to assist in providing facilities and equipment for the school and in promoting the recreation and welfare of the students at the school.

(ii) The functions:

- (a) to report, when requested by the Minister for Education and Training, on the material requirements of the school and to advise on the subject of maintenance of the school, alterations and additions to school facilities, and the selection of new sites;
- (b) to assist and co-operate with the teaching staff in public functions associated with the school;
- (c) to be responsible for the election of parent representatives to any school council constituted at the school in consultation with the Principal of the school to ensure consistency with any guidelines for elections issued by the Director General of Education and Training.

(d) to assist in any matters in which the Minister may seek the co-operation of the association and to exercise such other functions as may be prescribed by the regulations (under the Education Act 1990).

You must not stop on the road
alongside a car that is parked at

NO PARKING

You have two minutes to drop-off or pick-up and
must stay within three metres of your vehicle.

If no spaces are available you cannot queue on the
road way or in any other zones while waiting for a
space. You will need to drive away and park elsewhere,
only returning when there is space to pull up.

Fine: exceeds \$201
Demerit points: 2



FOOTPATH, DRIVEWAY OR NATURE STRIP

You must not stop across a driveway,
footpath and nature strip for any
reason.

Fine: exceeds \$362
Demerit points: 2



NO STOPPING

You cannot stop in a no stopping zone for any
reason (including queuing or waiting for a space).

Fine: exceeds \$362
Demerit points: 2



PEDESTRIAN CROSSING

You must not stop on or within 20
metres before a pedestrian crossing or
10 metres after a crossing (unless a sign
allows you to park there).

BUS ZONE

You must not stop or park in a bus zone for any
reason (including queuing or waiting for a space)
unless you are driving a bus.

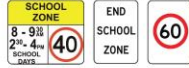

SPEEDING

40km/h school zones are in force on all days which are not a weekend, a public holiday or
