Careers Corner

Year 10 Subject Selection

Following a successful Year 10 Preliminary Course Selection evening, Year 10 students have been busy thinking about their course choices for their senior school years.

Year 10 students should now be talking to their teachers and parents before completing their EOI choices for Preliminary 2025 and HSC 2026. This EOI will be emailed to all Year 10 students in Week 11 of Term 1 and is due by Friday 3rd of May 2024 (Week 1 Term 2).

Year 11 Career Planning

During their Welfare period in Week 7, students were required to log onto the secure area of the Concord High School Careers website (aka Career Tools), to create a Career Plan. Instructions about how to do this were posted on the Year 11 Google Classroom. Students were assigned the task of completing their Career Plan in preparation for an upcoming face-to-face meeting with one of the Careers Advisers.

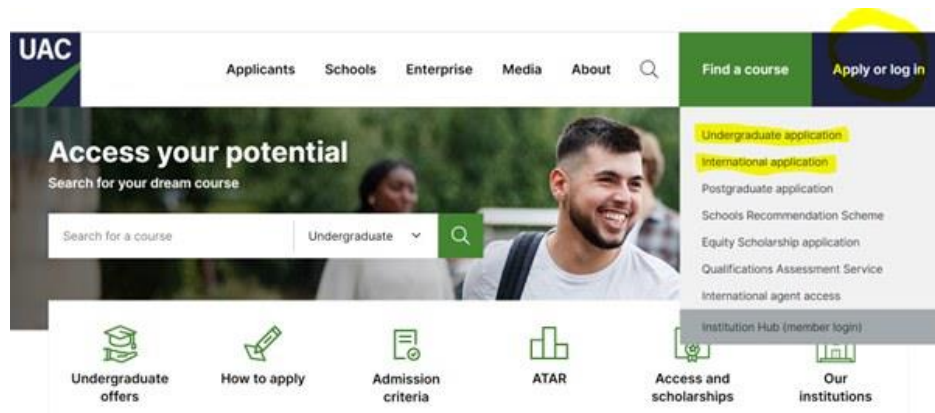
Please ask your child to log onto the “login” area of the Concord High School Careers website <https://www.concordhighschoolcareers.com/> and show you their Career Plan. If your child has not yet completed their plan, they should complete this as soon as possible. Please encourage them to have this completed by the end of the school holidays. Students must have their plan completed before being seen for their Careers interview from Term 2.

Year 12 Post School Planning and Preparation

April is also a time when Year 12 students should be seriously considering what course or career they would like to pursue beyond school and making some decisions. Students have many options to choose from, so they should be actively researching. They can use websites such as the Concord High School Careers website <https://www.concordhighschoolcareers.com/> which is a great starting point. They should also be regularly referring to their Year group Google Classroom where regular updates and information are posted, including the regular Careers Newsletter. Year 12 students will soon be invited for a Careers interview to discuss their post-school plans and what preparations they are making towards this.

For students planning to go to university next year, now is the time to commence preparations - start at the UAC website.

The University Admissions Centre (UAC) The Universities Admissions Centre (UAC) processes applications for admission to most undergraduate courses at participating institutions (mainly located in NSW and the ACT). UAC also: - calculate and provide the Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR) to NSW HSC students - process applications for Educational Access Schemes (EAS) <https://www.uac.edu.au/future-applicants/scholarships-and-schemes/educational-access-schemes> - process applications for some Equity Scholarships (ES) <https://www.uac.edu.au/future-applicants/scholarships-and-schemes/equity-scholarships> - process applications for some Schools Recommendation Schemes (SRS). <https://www.uac.edu.au/future-applicants/scholarships-and-schemes/schools-recommendation-schemes> On the 3rd of April (Week 10), UAC emailed all Year 12 students their **UAC pin** number, via their school email. Year 12 students intending to go to university should use this pin to create a profile (account) on the UAC website. The purpose of creating a UAC profile is to apply for courses at multiple universities with a single application. Creating an account also allows students to monitor the progress of their application, and to receive updates on offers. Creating an account involves a fee of \$80, if paid for before the 30th of September (early bird rate). The fee is increased after this date. *International students will need to wait until the 17th of April before they can start their International Student application, on the UAC website.* If your child did not receive their UAC pin in their school email inbox, please contact UAC on (02) 9752 0200 for assistance. (When contacting UAC, the student's ID (NESA number) will be requested). To apply for university via UAC, students will need: - Their UAC pin - Their NESA number (see Students Online website; or ask the Careers Adviser or Year Advisers at school) - Their USI (students must "Get a USI" on the Unique Student Identifier website, if they do not have one already). See <https://www.usi.gov.au/students/get-a-usi> - Identification (ID) for creating their USI. - A credit card, PayPal or BPay, for the amount of \$80. Students can then register an account on the UAC website by visiting the UAC website and going to the top right-hand corner to "Apply or log in". All students should select **Undergraduate** application, unless they are an **International** student (*apply from 17th of April*).

- 18 December - HSC & ATAR Results Released
- mid December - December Round 2 Offer Deadline and released
- 2 January - January Round 1 preferences deadline
- 9 January - January Round 1 offers made
- 15 January - January Round 2 preferences deadline
- 22 January - January Round 2 offers made
- 7 February 2025 - Applications for Semester 1 2025 Close

IMPORTANT INFORMATION FROM OUR CONSTITUTION

The objects and functions of this association shall be those set out in Section 116 of the Education Act 1990, which include:

(i) The objects:

(a) to promote the interests of the school by bringing parents, citizens, students and teaching staff into close co-operation; and

(b) to assist in providing facilities and equipment for the school and in promoting the recreation and welfare of the students at the school.

(ii) The functions:

(a) to report, when requested by the Minister for Education and Training, on the material requirements of the school and to advise on the subject of maintenance of the school, alterations and additions to school facilities, and the selection of new sites;

(b) to assist and co-operate with the teaching staff in public functions associated with the school;

(c) to be responsible for the election of parent representatives to any school council constituted at the school in consultation with the Principal of the school to ensure consistency with any guidelines for elections issued by the Director General of Education and Training.

(d) to assist in any matters in which the Minister may seek the co-operation of the association and to exercise such other functions as may be prescribed by the regulations (under the Education Act 1990).

DOUBLE PARKING

Do not double park at any time. Double parking is illegal and dangerous especially around schools. It reduces visibility and blocks the road for other motorists.

FINE EXCEEDS \$362 + 2 DEMERIT POINTS

U TURNS

- Performing U turns or 3 point turns in school zones is extremely dangerous.
- Performing U turns across unbroken centre lines is illegal and is particularly dangerous around schools.

FINE EXCEEDS \$481 + 4 DEMERIT POINTS

PARKING / STOPPING NEAR INTERSECTIONS

It is illegal to park or stop less than 10 metres from an intersection with no traffic lights as this blocks visibility for turning drivers and creates a hazard for all motorists.

FINE EXCEEDS \$514 + 2 DEMERIT POINTS

PEDESTRIAN CROSSINGS AND CHILDREN'S CROSSINGS

- Slow down as you approach pedestrian crossings and children's crossings.
- Do not proceed if the road beyond the crossing is blocked.
- Do not stop or park in the No Stopping zones on either side of the crossing as this blocks visibility.
- At a children's crossing you must stop at or before the stop line if there is a pedestrian about to cross or already on the crossing.
- Do not proceed through a children's crossing until all pedestrians have completely cleared the crossing.

FINE EXCEEDS \$514 + 2 DEMERIT POINTS

HOLDING HANDS IN TRAFFIC

- Children need assistance in the traffic environment until at least the age of 10. They are not equipped physically or developmentally to make the crucial decisions to keep themselves safe.
- All children need to be actively supervised in and around moving vehicles, footpaths, shared paths, driveways, car parks, at traffic lights, pedestrian crossings, on quiet streets and busy roads.
- Make sure you always set a good example around traffic and talk to your children about why you are stopping at the kerb and what you are watching and listening for. Explain where and when it is safe to cross and why.
- Hold hands with your children around traffic. If your hands are full, make sure your child holds onto your bag, pram or even your arm or sleeve.

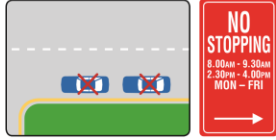
Road Rule Reminders



The fines and demerit points in this brochure apply in school zones.

NO STOPPING ZONES

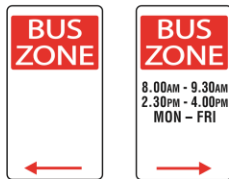
No Stopping signs mean you must not stop here at any time. If times of operation are shown on the sign, the restriction applies only at those times. An unbroken yellow kerb line is a no stopping line. You must not stop for any reason.



FINE EXCEEDS \$362 + 2 DEMERIT POINTS

BUS ZONE SIGNS

A Bus Zone is a No Stopping zone for vehicles other than buses. If times of operation are shown on the sign, the restriction applies only at those times. You must not park your vehicle less than 20 metres before or 10 metres after a bus stop.

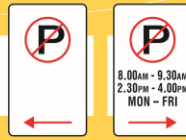


FINE EXCEEDS \$387 + 2 DEMERIT POINTS

NO PARKING SIGNS

You can only stop in a No Parking zone while picking up or setting down passengers or goods. You have a **maximum of 2 minutes** from the time you stop and must **stay within 3 metres** of your vehicle at all times.

If times of operation are shown on the sign, the restriction applies only at those times. This is not a waiting zone.

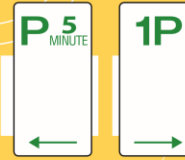


FINE EXCEEDS \$201 + 2 DEMERIT POINTS

TIME RESTRICTED PARKING

Parking signs with specified time limits allow drivers to park their vehicle for a maximum period of time, e.g. 5 minutes, 1 hour etc.

If times of operation are shown on the sign, the restriction applies only at those times.



FINE EXCEEDS \$129

DRIVEWAYS AND FOOTPATHS

- When exiting or entering a driveway a vehicle must give way to pedestrians on the footpath.
- Driveways are not playgrounds. Be aware that children can go unnoticed in front and behind your vehicle. Do not solely rely on reverse sensors or cameras in your vehicle.
- Always supervise and hold a child's hand near/crossing driveways.
- It is illegal to park in or across any driveway or to block a footpath at any time.



FINE EXCEEDS \$387 + 2 DEMERIT POINTS

USING MOBILE PHONES

- It is illegal to make or receive a call on your mobile phone while you are driving unless your phone is secured in a fixed mounting or does not require you to touch or manipulate the phone in any way.
- It is illegal to use the other features of a mobile phone such as texting, emailing etc unless your car is legally parked and the ignition is switched off.
- Using mobile phones is a major distraction for drivers and incurs higher fines and demerit points in school zones.

FINE EXCEEDS \$481 + 5 DEMERIT POINTS

Illegal parking puts children's lives at risk

School Pick-Up Drop-Off Zones

Understanding the rules

School Pick-Up Drop-Off Zones are for your child's safety, your convenience and help reduce congestion. They are always on school side of the road.

RULES

- School Pick-Up Drop-Off Zones and 'No Parking' zones operate under the same conditions – vehicles may stop to drop off or pick up children for a maximum of 2 minutes
- Driver must remain in or within 3 metres of vehicle
- Zone applies only during hours of operation



REMEMBER

- **DO NOT LEAVE YOUR VEHICLE:** To assist with traffic flow, drivers should remain in the car whilst children get in and out
- **BE TIMELY:** If your child does not get in or out of the vehicle within 2 minutes, you must leave and re-enter the No Parking zone
- **STAY IN SEQUENCE:** Don't cut in the queue. Pick-up or Drop-off your child close to the top of the zone, allowing vehicles following you to enter the zone in an orderly manner
- **SAFETY DOOR:** Always ensure children get in and out of the vehicle via safety door (rear footpath side door). Back seat is always safest for children to travel in. Make sure all children have their restraints securely fastened before driving off
- **NO U-TURNS:** Do not make u-turns in busy school zones. They are dangerous and put children at risk. (Fines and demerit points apply)
- Never use mobile phone in School Pick-up Drop-off Zone (Fines & demerit points apply)



School Pick-Up Drop-Off Zones need cooperation to ensure the safety of all children. Please drive carefully around school zones.

SCHOOL ZONES

Understanding the rules

School zones operate between 8am - 9.30am and 2.30pm - 4pm during school term. A speed limit of 40km/h as well as increased fines and demerit points apply during these hours.

NO STOPPING

- Stopping is not permitted at any time
- Dropping off or picking up passengers is not permitted
- Minimum penalty \$352 and 2 demerit points



NO PARKING

- Drivers may stop to drop off or pick up passengers for a maximum of 2 minutes
- Drivers must remain within 3 metres of vehicle
- Vehicle must not be left unattended
- Minimum penalty \$196 and 2 demerit points



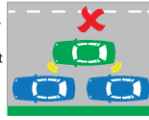
BUS ZONE

- Stopping is not permitted in a bus zone
- Dropping off or picking up passengers is not permitted
- Minimum penalty \$352 and 2 demerit points



DOUBLE PARKING

- Stopping next to legally parked vehicles is not permitted
- Dropping off or picking up passengers is not permitted
- Minimum penalty \$352 and 2 demerit points



DRIVEWAYS & FOOTPATHS

- It is illegal to park on or across a driveway, footpath or any other vehicle access
- Minimum penalty \$352 and 2 demerit points



MOBILE PHONES

- It is illegal to use mobile phones while driving
- \$469 penalty and 5 demerit points
