Principal's Message

Dear Parents, Carers, Student and Staff,

Major Build

Due to commence next week Monday 26th August

Estimated completion date is Mid-2026; however, we anticipate occupying the new buildings from the start of the 2026 school year.

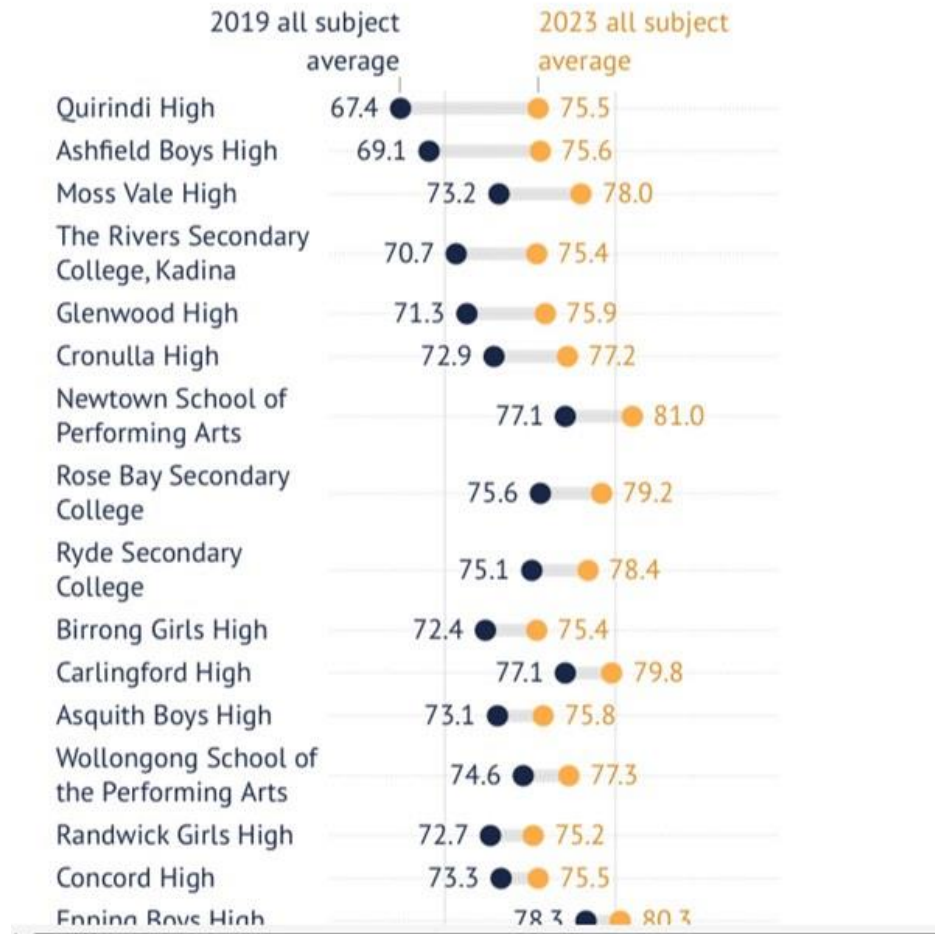
What will this mean for our school community?

- We will have a messy 18 months BUT we will continue to prioritise teaching and learning, together with student and staff wellbeing throughout the process.
- The end result will be well worth it. Our school will be upgraded, modernised and future-proofed for many years to come.
- We will have state of the art teaching and learning spaces, a new school hall, dedicated Creative and Performing Arts spaces, a new health and fitness space, a support unit for students with additional learning needs and a dedicated Student Wellbeing Hub.

Some important considerations **Traffic and Parking** – The main vehicle access to the construction site will be from Stanley Street. Stanley street will remain our main bus drop off and pick up point. Although Stanley Street will remain an option for families to drop off and pick up, this will NOT be recommended. Pedestrian access is being created from St Lukes Oval directly into the school, via the rear of the temporary canteen. This will be covered, lit, all weather access. We would encourage all families to use the Crane Street access. **Safety** – Student and staff safety will be a paramount consideration during the build period. We will be keeping vehicle movement into the school clearly separated from pedestrian movement. To support this we will be restricting access for students around the Crane St demountable area of the school. This will create new out-of-bounds areas that will be clearly communicated to students. We will be seeking parent and carer support with the implementation of these areas. **Noise and Dust** – The contractors have a WHS Management Plan in place to minimise these factors. We anticipate that the majority of the major demolition works will be completed during the spring school holidays. **Upgrade of Existing Facilities** The tender process has now closed. We anticipate that a contractor will be appointed to this job in mid-September, and works are likely to commence during the spring school holidays. **Recognition of Amazing Growth and Achievement** Recently the Sydney Morning Herald published a table of schools in the state that achieved the greatest growth in HSC results between 2019-2023. This was measured by the change in average course HSC mark. The table below shows **Concord High as being 15th out of 507 schools** where students sit the HSC exams across NSW. An amazing achievement and testimony to our dedicated teaching staff, incredible students and outstanding levels of family support that we enjoy here at Concord High.

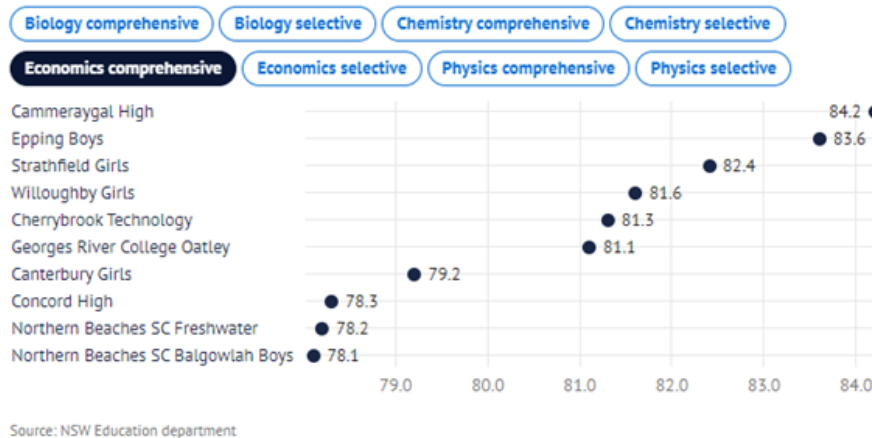


HSC 2023: Biggest improvers

Careers Corner

Term 3 is a busy term in Careers:

- * Year 10 completed their Subject Selections in Week 3. Some students have also undertaken work experience.
- * Year 12 are busy applying for early entry schemes, scholarships, special access schemes; attending university Open Days, and webinars; as well as some students completing their major works – all this in amongst completing their Trial exams.
- * Year 11 and Year 12 are continuing with Careers interviews. Please ensure your child attends, especially when scheduled for Period 1 or Period 6 - late arrivals and early leavers may miss out on an appointment, if they do not attend when they have been scheduled.

Important UAC information and key dates

- Applications for university courses are done through the **University Admissions Centre (UAC)**.
- Applying for a UAC account costs **\$80** and ***increases to \$215 from the 1st of October***.
 - Domestic students apply here: <https://www5.uac.edu.au/uacug/>
 - International students apply here: <https://www9.uac.edu.au/uacos/>
- The UAC account is where students:
 - Choose their university course preferences
 - Once they choose their preferred university courses, students should be actively managing their university course preferences https://youtu.be/1eHhnOrYyko?si=3bktEqPqKlhBYU_z
 - They can change the order of their university course preferences at any time - ***monitor the due dates (see below) for any early entry schemes they have applied for*** <https://www.uac.edu.au/current-applicants/undergraduate-applications-and-offers/early-offer-schemes-for-year-12-students> and change preferences accordingly.
 - Domestic students can apply for the **Schools Recommendation Scheme (SRS)** – this is one example of an early entry scheme. Locate it at the bottom section of their UAC account home page (after paying for their UAC account) – **SRS closes on the 16th of September (*offers made on the 8th of November*)**.
 - Domestic students who have been impacted by long-term adversity or disadvantage throughout Year 11 or Year 12 can apply for the **Educational Access Scheme (EAS)**.
 - **EAS closes on the 21st of November, but students should complete their application as soon as possible**, as EAS is taken into consideration for some early entry schemes.
 - The **ATARs are released on the 18th of December, from 9am**.

- Once ATAR results are known, students may **change preferences** for the **main round** (“December Round 2”). Do this by **midnight on 18th of December**.
 - **Main round offers are released on 23rd of December.** This is also when any early entry *conditional offers* are converted into *unconditional offers*.
 - If students do not get an offer for their preferred university course, they should accept another offer but can try again for their preferred course in the next round (January main round).
 - The January main round of offers (**January Round 1**) are **released on the 9th of January 2025**.
 - There is another smaller round in February – offers are released on the 7th of February.
 - If students are having any issues or have specific questions, they should contact UAC directly: <https://www.uac.edu.au/about/contact>
- Schools Recommendation Scheme (SRS)
 - Many universities participate in the UAC early entry scheme called **Schools Recommendation Scheme (SRS)**
 - In the SRS scheme, early offers are made by some universities, based on students’ Year 11 results AND the selection criteria/ ratings, based on the school’s recommendation.
 - For a list of universities participating in the SRS scheme, search here: <https://www.uac.edu.au/future-applicants/scholarships-and-schemes/schools-recommendation-schemes/institution-specific-srs-criteria> Macquarie, WSU and ACU are just some of the universities participating in this early entry scheme.
 - UTS participates in SRS for those students whose parent receives a Centrelink Family Tax Benefit Payment Part A.
 - The **closing date** for **SRS** is **16th of September**.
 - SRS offers (first round) are made on 8 November, after the HSC has finished (but before ATARs are released).
 - Further SRS offers are released on 21st of November and 5th of December (prior to ATARs being released).
 - Educational Access Scheme (EAS)
 - EAS aims to help students whose education has been negatively impacted during Year 11 and /or Year 12. International students are not eligible to apply.
 - Students access the EAS application via their UAC account (EAS tab).
 - EAS categories of disadvantage can be found in this document <https://www.uac.edu.au/assets/documents/eas/eas-application-guide.pdf>

- Categories include:
 - Disrupted schooling
 - Financial challenges (includes Family Tax Benefit Payment Part A)
 - Severe family disruption (includes death of a family member, parent separation, severe illness of a family member)
 - Excessive family responsibilities (includes care of a family member in the same household)
 - English language difficulty
 - Personal illness / disability (includes, but is not limited to, students receiving NESA Disability Provisions)
 - Refugee and humanitarian status
- **Students intending to apply for EAS need to complete their EAS application as soon as possible.** In many instances they must include an *Educational Impact Statement* (written by a school staff member) to support their application. This should be completed by one of the School Counsellors or Year 12 Advisers **by the end of Week 7** in Term 3. *Make an appointment as soon as possible - take your EAS application with you to your appointment.*
- Early entry programs, cadetship opportunities and scholarships

 - **UTS Early Entry Program** – closes 9th of September
 - **UNSW Gateway Admission Pathway**
 - Round 1 – applications closed 24th of July

- Round 2 – *applications close 11th of November*
- **Western Sydney University (WSU) HSC True Rewards** - 13th of November (Year 11 results) and 11 December (Year 12 results) - visit the HSC True Reward website for application closing details and offer dates for each round

- There are usually conditions to these early offers – minimum ATAR requirements, (however some early entry offers come without conditions).
- If students get an early offer, students should accept the offer but keep track of what offers they accept – if they decide later that they don't want the offer they must **withdraw before the census date**. <https://www.education.gov.au/higher-education-publications/higher-education-administrative-information-providers-october-2021/7-census-dates>
- Do not accept an offer if they know they will definitely not want to do the course.
 - Students should **stay committed and maintain their efforts for the final HSC exams** – final HSC exam results can significantly impact whether they get the ATAR they need to enter their preferred course.
 - Do not **enrol** into any course until after the ATARs have been released – otherwise they will be liable for the fees (unless they withdraw before the university's census date).
- UTS offers Cadetship opportunities for Computing Science and for Cybersecurity, through their Industry Degree Academy (IDeA) program. <https://www.uts.edu.au/about/faculty-engineering-and-information-technology/programs-and-scholarships/courses-cadetships> Applicants must apply for these via UTS and UAC. The closing date for these is 15th of September, 2024.
 - Universities advertise their scholarships on their websites – some universities have a one-stop scholarship portal to apply for all their available scholarships. Alternatively, students can find scholarships by researching on the Good Universities Guide – see the “scholarships” tab <https://www.gooduniversitiesguide.com.au/> **TAFE, apprenticeships and traineeships**
- **TAFE applications for Semester 1 2025 usually open in October** – check the TAFE website for details and look at the entry requirements when applying for a course

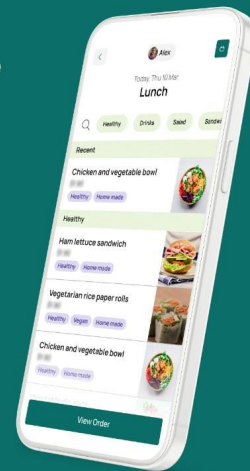
